

Programme 1: Sexual Reproductive Health & Rights Programme

PROJECT 1.0 GIRLS ON TRANSFORMATIVE ADVOCACY (GoTA)

A project funded by Amplify Change which focused on supporting the county government of Mombasa-Department of health to develop Mombasa county Adolescent and young people monitoring and evaluation implementation framework 2018-2023.

This project was implemented from April 2019-May 2020. It was implemented in Mombasa County. We first trained a pool of 30 young people as young champions on policy and budget advocacy.

The latter were mandated to reach out to other young people with the same information on how together they could push policy makers and stakeholders at county level to develop that framework.

Results; The organization held 5 strategic stakeholders forums towards development of the implementation framework with key policy makers and partners working on SRHR in the county, the young champions held 6 consultative forums, 5 community integrated outreaches, 4 radio talk shows (Sauti ya Pwani, Msenangu, Pwani and Radio Citizen), 2 live national TV broadcast (K24 & KBC) and 1 community dialogue with young people to collect their voices to be submitted during stakeholders engagement as ASKs. The ASKs played a key role in our advocacy agenda.

The project reached 1,772 young people with SRHR advocacy messages, 1,157 females and 615 males.

As a result of our advocacy work, the county government of Mombasa department of health, developed the Mombasa County Adolescent and Young People Monitoring and Evaluation Implementation framework 2018- 2023 and successfully launched it in November 2019 and partners reporting template for all CSOs working on health programmes for adolescents and young people in the county.





PROJECT 2.0 KIJANA IMARIKA BONGA ELIMIKA (KIBE)

A project funded by Population Connection which aimed to address the SRH outcomes of adolescents and Young people in the marginalized areas of Jomvu and Changamwe sub-Counties which will in turn contribute to a healthy population of Adolescents and young people in Mombasa County.

This project was implemented between February 2020 – December 2020. We first trained 30 community health workers and adolescent champions who would engage other adolescents and young people in Changamwe & Jomvu subcounties. The 30 were trained as community youth champions.

Results: The project reached a total of 773 (251 males 522 females) adolescents and young people throughout its implementation period. The beneficiaries were reached through community youth villages, community dialogue, international day's commemoration, policy makers meeting and The Girl summit event.

As a result, these activities built the capacities of the adolescents and young people hence giving them the synergy to advocate for their sexual reproductive health rights.



Project 3.0 Stories of Change

A project funded by Population Reference Bureau (PRB) that aimed at developing two advocacy communication materials that is digital, interactive data visualization and short videos. Through the digital, interactive data visualization and short videos we targeted the county government of Mombasa, specifically Mombasa county assembly health committee members, County executive committee member Health (Minister), Reproductive health coordinator, county director of finance and economic planning and the Governor of Mombasa where we sparked conversations around high rates of teenage pregnancies in the county, high rates of unsafe abortion cases among adolescents and young people and the impact it has to the economy of Mombasa County.

GOAL

Problems

Results: Through the project our 8 staffs were trained on development of two advocacy communication material (WhatsApp English and Kiswahili videos and power point presentation on AYSRH/FP needs for Mombasa County).

As a result of the development of the two advocacy communications materials and presentation to key county policy makers, we saw an increase of county of Mombasa with specific department of health services allocate 5 M kshs to support adolescents and youth SRH programming in Financial year FY 2020/2021, from 3.5 M Khs FY 2019/2020.

Programme 2: Human Rights, Democracy and Good Governance

PROJECT 4.0 ENGAGING BODABODA YOUTH LEADERS (EBBY)

A project funded by Search for Common Ground through European Union which focused on creating enabling environment for BodaBoda youth sector to thrive through close partnership with security apparatus. EBBY sought at building the capacity of the BodaBoda Youths and leaders through building resilience in promoting peace and countering violent conflict in Changamwe and Jomvu subcounty. EBBY project Phase II was a continuation from the first phase under INUKA supported by Search for common ground. INUKA is a comprehensive youth-focused community peace building action across the Coastal region of Kenya. This project was implemented in Mombasa County (Jomvu & Changamwe sub-counties) from February 2020 – October 2020. Results: The entire project reached a total of 1,024 youths and women (940Males and 84females) throughout its implementation period. The beneficiaries were reached through various activities conducted; BodaBoda Youth Inception Meeting, BodaBoda stage Talks, Police and BodaBoda youth integration meetings, Moot Court and Mombasa County BodaBoda Youth Convention.





PROJECT 5.0 NJIA ZA HAKI (NZH)

A project funded by UNDP (United Nations Development Programme) Amkeni Wakenya Project in partnership with Kituo Cha Sheria which would enable community members' access justice.

The project is implemented from October 2019-March 2021 in Mombasa County.

Results: The entire project reached 213 people (127 males, 86 females) through access to justice meetings, video screening engagement, moot court and celebration of social justice day event. It also reached over 1,000 people (68% males & 32% females) through our online engagements and recorded 22 cases in our social justice desk.

As a result of access to justice program we successfully followed up a compensation case that was filed in our office, by ensuring that complaint got justice. He filed a complaint against G4S poorly handled his or her that led to the loss of his property. He was paid Ksh 45,000 as the compensation





Project 6.0 Hustle Yangu Haki Yangu (DRL)

A project funded by Solidarity Centre which seeks to improve enforcement of existing protections for informal economy workers and promote adoption of greater social protections. The Programs specific objectives and activities are designed to create awareness of informal economy workers' rights among unions, youth-led organizations, informal economy workers, local chiefs, communities and employers and to strengthen the institutional capacity of unions and youth-led organizations to be more sustainable, inclusive, and well-coordinated with local chiefs so that all three are equipped to effectively enforce and advocate for informal economy workers' rights. The project's implementing partners include KYEN in Nairobi & KUDHEIHA (Nairobi & Mombasa)

Results: The project reached a total of 420 informal workers (physically) through its first quarter period and over 2,500 people reached through various platforms such as Radio Talk-shows and Facebook lives that were conducted. Some of the activities during this quarter mainly constituted of Chief Barraza's as well as leveraging on other activities that the organization were doing.

As a result12 cases of informal workers' rights were successfully reported through toll-free line calls.



Achievements



We successfully implemented 6 impactful projects in Mombasa, Kenya in the year 2020 targeting adolescents, young people and women of Kenya.

We organized and hosted the 2nd Girls Summit in Kenya which attracted attention of many partners and acted as a best practice for other counties to emulate. The summit hosted high profile individual who was the chief guest (Chief Administrative Secretary- Ministry of ICT & innovation Miss Nadia Ahmed Abdallah) and UNFPA representative. Which led to successfully launch of the "community talking boxes" that would help adolescents and young people to share their issues both in schools and at the community level

We participated in the 4 conferences through abstracts submissions, moderations, and as active participants. The 4 conferences were 4th Scientific Reproductive Health Network Kenya conference in Diani-Kwale where through UNFPA network sponsored 7 young people to attend by receiving full sponsorship, Men4Periods conference where we actively played key roles, 9th Africa Conference on Sexual Health and Rights and MHM Inclusion conference.

We provided adolescents and young girls with 112 sanitary pads and information on Menstrual Hygiene Management

We provided adolescent and young girls aged 10-24 years with 155 dignity kits/bags during 2020 with support from UNFPA Kenya & CREAW Kenya.

We distributed 576 male condoms to young people while carrying out our integrated outreaches and peer to peer learning sessions

We reached 2,022 people with Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights advocacy information and messages.

We reached 1,066 people with Human Rights and Democracy information, messages and services, 12 people successfully accessed justice from the cases documented at our Access to Justice Center through our community paralegals

We actively participated in active learning programme (YALI) for East Africa which happened in Nairobi-Kenya.

Our advocacy efforts contributed to;

- i. An increase in county of Mombasa with specific department of health services allocate 5 M kshs to support adolescents and youth SRH programming in Financial year FY 2020/2021, from 3.5 M Khs FY 2019/2020.
- ii. 6 BodaBoda youths in cooperated in peace and security committees in Changamwe & Jomvu sub-counties.
- One of our staff (Executive Director Dickson Okong'o) won an award from a highly contested nominations of youth in Kenya under category Youth of the Year 2020 Health services from Youth Agenda Kenya





"EBBY Project has contributed to a renewed relationship between us the BodaBoda of Changamwe and them. The police have trusted us to extent that they ask for our BodaBoda during curfew hours to move around in making sure that it is peaceful. We are now been hosted at the police station whenever we feel like having a meeting. We just need to make a phone call and it is arranged for us. Previously you could be asked to develop a letter 3 days before the event. It used to have a process but we thank stretchers youth Organization as this is of the past. The access to justice centre program led to one compensation case succeeding and the victim got paid his assets worth 45,000Kes from G4S who had led to loss by negligence and the compensation on one employment and labor relation case, the victim got a promise that he would be paid his dues as the business dissolution took place. Access Justice Centre.
