

The Organization works under three thematic areas with its direct beneficiaries, these include;

Health & Well-Being: whose strategic objective is to contribute to improved health outcome and well-being among youth in Kenya. This thematic area focuses on ensuring healthy lives and promoting well-being for youths and women in Kenya is achieved. We create demand to health and well-being services for youths and women and ensure uptake of such services is increased.

We achieve this through employing strategies such as; strategic partnership, collaboration and networking, policy advocacy on health issues affecting youth and women, advocating for increased resources on health, advocating for behavioral change communication and use of mainstream and social media advocacy to create awareness among others.

We had two projects that were implemented in 2023 (Adolescent Youth Empowerment Health Advocacy and WE LEAD)

Democracy and Good Governance

Whose strategic objective is to build a good culture of democracy and good governance in Kenya. This thematic area focuses on strengthening citizens' demand for transparency and accountability in the management of public resources, promoting citizen's participation in democratic processes and promoting citizen participation in advancing national integration.

We achieve this through employing strategies such as; empowering youth and women on their civic rights and governance, advocating for youth and women in meaningful engagement on governance and development process, use of mainstream and social media advocacy to create awareness, strategic partnership, collaboration and networking and advocating for progressive laws and policies affecting youths and women on civic and governance participation among others.

We had two projects implemented under this thematic area in 2023 (Mobilize Empower Actualize Transform and Youth Labor Social Accountability Project)






Human Rights & Gender Mainstreaming

Whose strategic objective is to improve access to justice and promote gender equality among youth in Kenya. This thematic area also seeks to promote social justice and realization of potential for youth and women among our communities.

We achieve this thematic area through employing strategies such as; Strategic partnership and collaboration with constitutional commissions & agencies, Community mobilization on gender empowerment, Use of mainstream and social media advocacy to create awareness, Capacity building and creating awareness on gender empowerment and Gender Main-streaming among others.

We had one project implemented under this thematic area in 2023 (Kujenga Amani Pamoja Project)

THEMATIC AREA 1: HEALTH & WELL-BEING

The following project contributed to strategic objective 1 of our strategic plan 2021-2025; to contribute to improved health outcome and well-being among youth in Kenya

Project 1.0 AYEHA


This is an ongoing project that sought to follow-up concerns and issues arising from the Community Talking Boxes to address the information gap for adolescents and young people and youth peer mentors/providers on provision of comprehensive sexuality education. This was traditionally a way of engaging adolescents and young people on matters of their sexuality. The model borrowed heavily from how the African parents used to engage their children on sexuality topics. It mixed the African approach to educating children on comprehensive sexuality education where the topics discussed have been derived from the needs of adolescents and young people themselves.

Strategic Goal: To contribute to improved health and well-being of adolescent and young people in Mombasa & Kwale Counties.

Project Objectives

- To improve equitable access to quality adolescents and young people-friendly sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR)/HIV information and services
- To strengthen the meaningful engagement of communities in adolescents and young people programs and policy processes
- To strengthen multi-sectorial coordination on SRHR/HIV health outcomes among adolescents and young people in Mombasa & Kwale Counties by 2023.





This is an ongoing project being implemented for 12 months (May 2023 - April 2024) that is funded by Population Connection. We first engaged with the Ministry of Education, School Health Coordinators, Teachers Service Commission, head teachers and principals of all the 11 schools where we had installed the Community Talking Box in multi-sectorial engagement meetings to allow for ownership of the project. We then trained guiding and counselling teachers on the usage of community talking box and how to address the challenges coming from the box. The trained guiding and counselling teachers with youth mentors held mentorship sessions with adolescents in schools.

Results: The project reached a total of 1,629 adolescents and young people throughout its implementation as at December 2023. The beneficiaries were reached through mentorship sessions, targeted community outreaches, community dialogue, international days, policy makers meeting and The Girl summit event. 24 mentorship sessions were held in eleven (11) schools in Mombasa County. A number of issues were raised in the community talking boxes and most issues raised revolved around school administration wise.

As a result, these activities improved health outcomes and wellbeing of the adolescents in schools that the project was being implemented. We saw student led peer education sessions conducted in the schools as a result of the mentorship sessions.

Project 2.0 WE LEAD

We Lead's goal is to: by the end of 2025, resilient young women with disabilities, living with HIV, affected by displacement or identifying as LBTI, play a leading role in strengthened and inclusive organizations and movements that enjoy increased public support and have convinced duty-bearers and health-service providers to take steps towards implementing laws, policies and practices that respect and protect these young women's SRH-R".

Stretchers Youth Organization is working towards building public support through holding community awareness, sensitization and use of information and communication approaches that aims to see to it that the targeted rights holders get positive recognition and support from the general public. SYO is working towards building and strengthening the rights holders' individual

and organizations capacities through the consistent application of the principles of non-discrimination, active participation and inclusion. By doing this, our right holders are empowered and have more control over decisions and resources that determine the quality of SRH-R services including structural inequalities hindering them from being heard.

This is an ongoing 5-year project (2021-2025) being implemented by a consortium of 11 organizations in Kenya where Stretchers Youth Organization implements it in Mombasa County with young women living with HIV/AIDS as their Right Holders. The project is being funded by HIVOS with Centre for Study of Adolescence being the Host Kenyan organization.





Results: We conducted a three days training for 20 right holders on SRH-R advocacy tools for effective County public participation on CIDPs, ADPs & budget tracking & social accountability in order for them to effectively advocate for progressive SRHR policies and budgets that reflects on the needs of young women living with HIV/AIDS. The trained 20 right holders engaged with policy makers, community members, health care providers and fellow adolescents and young people through structured community dialogues forums in a bid to improve service delivery. The 20 right holders in turn held strategic meetings with key policy makers at County and National level of governments to review policies and budgets, participated in public participation forums among many others. The project reached 1,032 people (884F, 148M)

As a result, these activities contributed to active participation of right holders in Mombasa County technical team developing the 2nd edition of the Mombasa County Adolescents and Young people Strategy 2023-2028 (Still in draft format) on health that addresses issues of Sexual Reproductive health and HIV among other health issues affecting the adolescents and young people. On 13th July 2023 the Mombasa County Government Department of Public Service Administration Youth, Gender Social Services and Sports allocated a budget (5M KES) for the provision of Sanitary Pads in the Mombasa County Integrated Development Plan 2023-2027 and 1M KES in Annual Development Plan 2023-2024 Financial Year.

THEMATIC AREA 2: DEMOCRACY & GOOD GOVERNANCE

The following projects contributed to strategic objective 2 of our strategic plan 2021-2025; to build a good culture of democracy and good governance in Kenya.

Project 3.0 MEAT


This was a 24-month project (July 2021 – July 2023) and was supported by Voice under the influence grant. The goal of the project is to promote increased peaceful inclusion of youth in political processes in the forthcoming general election so as to ensure that they have greater participation in decision making roles which have a large impact in their lives.

Strategic Goal: To promote increased peaceful inclusion of youth in political processes in the forthcoming general election so as to ensure that they have greater participation in decision making roles which have a large impact in their lives

Project objectives

- To promote meaningful youth engagement on democratic, political and electoral participation processes in coastal region of Kenya.
- To increase knowledge about democratic, political and electoral processes among youths and women across the coastal region of Kenya.
- To raise awareness on civic education among the youth in three counties of the Coast by enhancing their full participation in democratic, political and electoral processes.





Results: We conducted 9 youth leaders engagement forums, 3 integrational dialogues, 5 youth open mics during the year 2023. As a result of the engagements with our trained civic educators, the project inspired and natured youth leaders who have gone ahead to establish and/or strengthen their own grassroots organizations in the Coast region, i.e. Tulinde Future Yetu Organization – Kwale County, Kwale County Youth Focus, Leadership for Impact - Kilifi County, The Amplifiers Youth Organization - Mombasa County, Likoni Disability Network - Mombasa County among others. The project also contributed to the election of three Member of County Assemblies MCAs (Hon. Franklin Makanga MCA Chaani ward - Mombasa

County, Hon. Yusuf Sengesa MCA Mkongani ward – Kwale County, Hon. Ray Katana MCA Sokoni ward – Kilifi County). The elected leaders were all in the age gap of youth and this was their first time holding elective positions. Through the civic educators in Kilifi County, we submitted a memorandum towards development of Kilifi youth policy. Youths' participation in the governance of the country and at the county level enhanced by contributing to the third County Integrated Development Plans 2023-2027 development process by kick starting the development of memoranda to be submitted during public participation and development processes.

Project 4.0 YOUTH LABOR SOCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY PROJECT (YLSAP)

This was a 12- months project (Feb 2023-Jan 2024) that was supported by Solidarity Centre for implementation in Mombasa County (Changamwe & Jomvu sub counties).

The project's objective:

 To bolster civic participation of trade unions, civil society, women, and youth in the informal economy in policy and legislative advocacy and accountability.

The project adopted an approach that sought to strengthen trade unions, CSOs, and community collaborations in advocacy for enhanced worker rights protections and accountability by government officials and elected leaders. The approach is informed by the need to complement strengths of both the unions and CSOs

Efforts under this objective serve to:

- Increase the voice of the labor movement in accountability and transparency advocacy efforts at the county government level in Mombasa and Kisumu
- Foster and deepen broader cooperation and collaborations between the labor movement and other civil society organizations in Kisumu and Mombasa.
- Enhance labor movement's power to influence policies that seek better protection for worker rights including women workers, youth in the informal economy and workers in the public service.







Results: Results: We conducted 2 youth strategy meetings, 4 social accountability meetings, 6 social media engagements with Mombasa County Assembly Members and youth in the informal work and participated in 8 public participation forums in a bid to advocate for safe working environment for youth informal workers

As a result, our civic education awareness engagements contributed to sustained peace during the August 2022 general elections in Mombasa County. Members of Mombasa County Assembly approved a motion seeking

the County Executive to allocate funds in its annual budget to finance the procurement of sanitary towels for young women and girls within the County.

Our continuous advocacy work contributed to Mombasa County Department of Finance and Appropriation Committee allocate funds (KES 14,000,000) to establish 6 Small business development centres across the entire Mombasa County in the Mombasa County Integrated Development Plan 2023-2027.

HUMAN RIGHTS & GENDER MAINSTREAMING

THEMATIC AREA 3: HUMAN RIGHTS & GENDER MAINSTREAMING

The following projects contributed strategic objective 3 of our strategic plan 2021-2025; to improve access to justice and promote gender equality among youth in Kenya

Project 5.0 KUJENGA AMANI PAMOJA (KAP) PROJECT (BUILDING PEACE TOGETHER)

This is a 36 months project (Feb 2023-Feb 2026) funded by European Union implemented as a consortium organization in the coastal bordering regions in Kenya, Tanzania and Mozambique. In Kenya We World is the lead partners while Stretchers Youth Organization is the affiliate partner. The project target areas are: Kenya (Kwale county), Tanzania (Tanga and Mtwara regions), and Mozambique (Cabo Delgado and Nampula provinces). Stretchers Youth Organization partnered with We World to implement its target area in Kwale at Matuga, Msambweni, and LungaLunga Sub-Counties.

Overall objective:

 Aware and mobilized young women and men living in the coastal bordering areas of Kenya, Tanzania, and Mozambique act as peacebuilders and agents of positive change.

Specific objective:


 Young women and men-led networks and organization's (formal and informal) actively practice and disseminate learning on building peace, preventing conflicts and promoting inclusion within peacecentred Swahili cultural practices in Kenya (Kwale county), Tanzania (Tanga and Mtwara regions) and Mozambique (Cabo Delgado and Nampula provinces).





Results: A lot of work in the year 2023 has been in planning for the project with lead partner and the other consortium partners funded by European Union (CEFA lead partner in the other consortium – Kujenga Amani Project). The meetings held through-out the year yielded fruits by development and establishment of good working systems for both consortiums to avoid duplication of work. The project also conducted research on the Swahili coast culture that would improve the project's successes.





e are pleased to present the key highlights of our organization for the year 2023 in this annual report. Throughout the year, we have made significant progress in aligning our programs with the organizational Strategic Plan 2021-2025, expanding our reach, and enhancing our growth and capacity.

- Strategic Alignment and Lessons Learned: One of the key accomplishments of the year was successfully aligning our programs with the goals and objectives outlined in our Strategic Plan 2021-2025. This alignment has allowed us to focus our efforts on priority areas and work towards our long-term vision. Along the way, we have gathered valuable lessons that have informed our decision-making and improved our program implementation.
- Implementation: In 2023, we embarked on an ambitious expansion initiative by implementing a specific project in Kwale County. This expansion has enabled us to extend our impact and support the communities in Kwale County with targeted interventions. Additionally, we are proud to announce the establishment of our first satellite office outside the main office in Mombasa. This satellite office will act as a strategic hub to effectively serve the needs of the local communities in that
- Growth and Capacity Development: As part of our commitment to organizational growth and continuous improvement, we have achieved significant milestones in enhancing our internal systems and processes. In 2023, we successfully validated and began implementing our Human Resource Manual, which will provide clear guidelines and procedures

- for effective management and development of our staff. Additionally, we conducted a thorough review and update of our Finance Manual, ensuring its alignment with organization's best practices and regulatory standards. The revised Finance Manual will be fully operational within the first quarter of 2024, further strengthening our financial management practices.
- We successfully implemented 5 impactful projects (funding from Population Connection, CSA-HIVOS, European Union through We World, Solidarity Centre and Voice to support our projects) in Mombasa, Kwale and Kilifi Counties -Kenya in the year 2023 targeting youth and women in Kenya.
- Successfully conducted the 5th Girl Summit held in Nairobi City County and graced by H.E Cabinet Secretary Youth Affairs, Sports and The Arts (H.E Ababu Namwamba), Nairobi City County Women Representative (H.E Esther Passaris), The University of Nairobi Vice Chancellor (Prof. Stephen Gitai Kiama), Chief Officer of Nairobi City County Administration and Public Participation (Md. Lydia Martha)
- We organized several impactful campaigns, one of which was the **#SilencedNoMore** campaign. This particular campaign gained widespread attention and trended on X, generating over 1,200,000 impressions.
- Another impactful event was, the 5th Girl Summit #TGSikoKanairo, trending at number 8 for a significant part of the week, reaching over 1,048,436 impressions.





HEALTH & WELL-BEING AGE SEGREGATION 3000 2500



Name: **Betty Kageni Ngonde**Sub County: **CHANGAMWE**

"My name is Betty Kageni Ngonde. I am a graduate, completed my high school and partook in catering. I am currently involved in a mentorship program where I do mentorship sessions, offer guidance and counseling to youths and young mothers on issues of GBV, mental health and stigmatization.

I got involved in the We Lead program through an invitation to attend training from my area MCA who also happens to have a foundation that helps school going girls. In the beginning of the training that I attended, I thought it was just a normal talk only to get to know it ventured on growth of young girls and women living with HIV empowering them to take up leadership spaces and creating awareness on issues around, early pregnancy, stigmatization, GBV and mental health issues. The training went further to empower us on budgeting and how to hold leaders accountable on the different developmental issues.

From the training, I came to understand that there are people who pass through a lot of challenges and don't get the opportunity to speak out. During the training, the terms and language used when learning were easy and understandable hence suitable but not difficult.

At the moment I am under a different organization where I am practicing what I learnt from the training and other engagements. I am volunteering as a mentor in the organization that I am currently in. The organization helps us reach out to the young people and help them to become self-aware of their surroundings and happenings hence girls are encouraged to speak out when their rights are violated.

I have been able to speak to young teenagers who are trying to find their purpose in life at an individual level and also reached out to several people in my community.

My future plans is having to reach out a wide range of people and getting more opportunities to mentor the young mothers and youths, having trainer of trainees of GBV champions that will be able to tackle issues in the community and helping young women living with HIV to overcome self-stigmatization"



"My name is Monica Kaugi, and I am currently 23 years old and a single mother of two gorgeous daughters. I became a mom at eighteen years old. It was not easy for me, but I thank God for that. I became a single mom after the man responsible for the pregnancy I had decided to neglect me. At the time I was in college in my final year, I was traumatized. I wanted to quit college but thinking of how long I would have wasted myself an opportunity to an opportunity to pursue my goals. I decided to finish college and that was the same time I knew that I was HIV positive, I really felt like giving up everything. I felt demoralized and come to think of it I didn't expect any of that to happen to me at the time.

It was difficult at first because I had to go for counselling session and ANC clinic at the same time study for my final exam. My family has been my source of strength since we share the same status and they encouraged me live positively.

My hobbies are travelling, giving advice and living the moment. I like open minded people, interaction with -everyone, self-respect and responsible people. What I hate most, judgmental people and people who're critics of others.

I came to know about the Lead program through one of the mentor mothers who referred me to Stretchers Youth Organization, I then attended their seminars and in house training and that where I started learning ways of talking to my fellow young mother and those that I knew we shared same health status. I then decided to form a group called Young Women Alliance meant for young women who for young who are infected, affected or stigmatized of HIV/AIDS, early marriage and teenage pregnancy. The group has a name, mission and vision and currently we are in the process of getting a CBO certificate.

We lead programme has truly built my capacity of different skills like self-awareness, self-confidence and even how to engage our leaders in the community. Today. I can stand with confidence and represent my fellow young mothers on challenges we are experiencing. However, I still need more encouragement and mentorship for building more on the skills."



During our breakout sessions, 6 thematic areas were discussed and from the discussions, we came up with several challenges including; Increase in Teenage pregnancies, Early marriages and HIV/STIs among young girls. We also have lack of sanitary towels and limited awareness on existing policies among others." Josephine Kavata, a young mother reading out some of the challenges discussed during breakout sessions to the policy makers at the girl summit event.





AYEHA project is here to help you overcome and cope up with your insecurities and challenges, use this opportunity to learn and unlearn. Make the most of it for your own benefit and trust me you will record positive results when the project comes to an end, I might not be around to attend to all of your issues in the Guiding and Counselling department but you have a mentor who is ready to help anytime, any day. Use that to your advantage." Madam Jedidah Juma, Guiding and Counselling Teacher, Maweni Mixed Secondary School.







Being a trained plumber, I walk with my plumbing tools from place to place looking for opportunities and employment to showcase my skills. I, on behalf of other young girls going through the same pose a question to Nairobi City County. What opportunities does the County Government of Nairobi have for young girls who are being trained as plumbers and electricians?" There was one time I boarded a matatu heading for an event and I looked distressed since I was receiving so many calls from my friends. A woman sitting next to me was concerned and asked what the problem was. After sharing the cause of my distress, the stranger opened up to me about how her son committed suicide because of mental health issues. She had seen signs that her son was not ok but never really engaged on a conversation with him until it was too late and the tragedy happened. She advised that as young people, it is important for us to create safe spaces for ourselves and tell our stories for us to deal with issues affecting us. The story that I have just passed across is a message for us young girls to be authentic and normalize creating safe space for our friends and peers. No man is an island and we need each other to survive the storms of life, you should never isolate yourself and handle issues in silence." There are no tailor-made services that can be well articulated to fit young girls and women. Most people use grown up mental health education curriculum on Young People. This is a big gap and A curriculum should be developed to fit the needs and issues affecting young people." For young girls, we should learn how to stay hygienically clean during our menses. Make sure you change your menstrual products after every 4-6 hours. Experiencing pain during menstruation is normal but experiencing excess and unbearable pain is not normal. In a situation where you experience painful menstruation, you should always inform your parent or guardian so as to get medical assistance." From the reports shared to me by youths in my line of work, I have discovered that young girls especially from marginalized areas of Kenya are facing SRHR challenges. There is no uniformity on availability of Youth Friendly Services as young girls have to walk miles just to acquire medical services and sometimes, they do not get help from those facilities. The government should work with stakeholders and not in Silos in order to make sure that a young girl in Ntulele is getting the same SRHR service as that one from Karen" Gordano Yusuf, a youth advocate from Isiolo and also Chair of ICPD 25 Youth coalition during a panel discussion on Climate Change at the Girl Summit Event.

In our community, FGM is part of our culture. A young girl who has not undergone the practice is seen as an outsider and that implies that you are not a real woman. If you run away from it, the community members will wait until you get pregnant and cut you in the delivery room. Gender Based Violence is also considered as part of our culture as punishment for young girls through beatings is considered normal. Young Girls undergo Gender Based Violence from the parents and spouses as it is passed from one generation to another until it has been considered a norm. Young girls passing through that fear talking about them and this platform has given me a chance to speak on their behalf in order to get necessary help from stakeholders. The Period Man is my mentor and I tend to walk on his footsteps as I inspire more young boys and men to advocate for the same." 
